SYSD SCHOOLS CONTINUE TO PROVIDE DISTANCE LEARNING ACADEMY FOR ALL STUDENTS

Our schools will continue to provide the Distance Learning Academy to all students at least through the end of February as we submit our board adopted, updated COVID Safety Plan to the health department for their review. Our district's COVID Safety Plan complies with the school safety guidelines delineated within the Governor's Safe Schools for All Plan released on January 14, 2021: Summary: California's Safe Schools for All Plan. The state's Safe Schools for All Plan allows TK-6th schools to reopen within counties where the COVID case rate is below 25/100,000, unless the school had already reopened while the county was in the Red or lower Tier. As of January 27th, the adjusted case rate in San Diego county was 49.6/100,000. Additionally, the district has been closely monitoring our local regional COVID case rates since spring 2020. Note, the new state guidance allows middle and high schools to reopen when the county case rate drops below the Purple Tier (7/100,000 or lower), unless they already reopened while the county was in the Red Tier or lower.

Finally, our district's Governing Board Members and Superintendent advocated for a COVID vaccine location to be opened in San Ysidro to support our community's collective efforts to keep everyone safe and to combat the pandemic. We are grateful that on Monday, February 1st, Supervisor Nora Vargas announced a new COVID-19 Vaccination Pod located at Southwestern College Higher Education Center (460 W San Ysidro Blvd, SY, Ca 92173) open Tues-Sat 9:30am-3:30pm. **Appointments required.**

PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICIALS LIFT REGIONAL STAY AT HOME ORDER FOR ALL REGIONS

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) ended the Regional Stay At Home Order on January 25, 2021 for all regions statewide because Intensive Care Unit capacity rose above 15%. Counties may now refer to the Blueprint for a Safer Economy that indicates which activities and businesses are open based on color-coded tiers, case rates and positivity. Public Health Officials Lift Regional Stay at Home Order for All Regions

Conditions Improving Statewide, Allowing Most Counties to Return to Most Strict (Purple) Tier of Blueprint for a Safer Economy

With Pandemic Far from Over, Californians Urged to Wear Masks, Limit Mixing, Get Vaccinated When Eligible

SACRAMENTO – Officials with the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) today ended the Regional Stay at Home Order, lifting the order for all regions statewide, including the three regions that had still been under the order – San Joaquin Valley, Bay Area and Southern California. Four-week ICU capacity projections for these three regions are above 15%, the threshold that allows regions to exit the order. The Sacramento Region exited the order on January 12 and the Northern California region never entered the order.

This action allows all counties statewide to return to the rules and framework of the <u>Blueprint for a Safer Economy</u> and color-coded tiers that indicate which activities and businesses are open based on local case rates and test positivity. The majority of the counties are in the strictest, or purple tier. Tier updates are provided weekly on Tuesdays. Individual counties could choose to impose stricter rules.

"Californians heard the urgent message to stay home as much as possible and accepted that challenge to slow the surge and save lives," said Dr. Tomás Aragón, CDPH director and state public health officer. "Together, we changed our activities knowing our short-term sacrifices would lead to longer-term gains. COVID-19 is still here and still deadly, so our work is not over, but it's important to recognize our collective actions saved lives and we are turning a critical corner."

While there are positive signs that the virus is spreading at a slower rate across the state, the COVID-19 pandemic is far from over. It is still critical that Californians

continue to wear masks when they leave their homes, maintain physical distance of at least 6 feet, wash their hands frequently, avoid gatherings and mixing with other households, follow all state and local health department guidance and get the vaccine when it's their turn.

The state, in collaboration with local health departments and health care facilities statewide, took a long list of actions to support California's hospitals and slow the surge in cases and hospitalizations.

- The Regional Stay at Home Order urged Californians to stay home except for essential activities, which helped lower disease transmission levels and reduce burden on the hospital system.
- California deployed more than 4,100 medical professionals to facilities across the state to ease the burden on frontline health care workers.
- The state provided assistance within hospitals in the form of personal protective equipment, ventilators and help with oxygen supply.
- California also helped hospitals expand their capacity by opening 16 alternate care sites, lower-acuity facilities where COVID-19 patients get a bridge from hospital to home as they are recovering.
- Public health leaders implemented a statewide order to make it easier to transfer patients from over-crowded hospitals to those with more space and staff.
- The administration of vaccines to health care workers has meant that fewer health care workers are falling ill to the virus, which helps keep staffing levels more stable.

"California is slowly starting to emerge from the most dangerous surge of this pandemic yet, which is the light at the end of the tunnel we've been hoping for," said California Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly. "Seven weeks ago, our hospitals and front-line medical workers were stretched to their limits, but Californians heard the urgent message to stay home when possible and our surge after the December holidays did not overwhelm the health care system to the degree we had feared."

Nearly all the counties exiting the Regional Stay at Home Order today are in the Purple or widespread (most restrictive) tier. Services and activities, such as outdoor dining and personal services, may resume immediately with required modifications, subject to any additional restrictions required by local jurisdictions. See the <u>county map</u> to find the status of activities open in each county.

Because case rates remain high across most of the state, the state's <u>Hospital Surge Order</u> remains in place to prevent hospitals from becoming overwhelmed. The <u>Limited Stay at Home Order</u>, which limits non-essential activities between the hours of 10 p.m. and 5 a.m., expires with the <u>Regional Stay At Home Order</u> ending.

Quick Tips To Make an Appointment at the Vaccine Super Station

- 1. First contact healthcare providers to request the vaccine, but if none are available, then they should make an appointment for the County's COVID-19 Vaccine Super Station
- Appointments are required and have to be made at www.VaccinationSuperStationSD.com
- 3. Do not schedule an appointment if you have COVID-19, or are sick. Please follow CDC guidance for those situations

- 4. Medical professionals administering the vaccine will be wearing personal protective equipment.
- 5. Wear a mask

- 6. Acceptable forms of proof to be presented at the County's Vaccine Super Station
 - a. Employee ID badge with photo or other documents, including a professional license and a photo ID, signed letter from their employer on facility letterhead and a photo ID; or, a payment stub or timesheet from their healthcare employer or in-home supportive services with a photo ID

SYMS & VDM TO JOIN GATES FOUNDATION: CARE NETWORK

Both San Ysidro Middle School and Vista Del Mar Middle School have been chosen to participate in the CARE Network, which is funded through the Gates Foundation. This is a multi-year cohort and as such has staggered start dates, SYMS will begin in January 2021 and VDM will be able to participate beginning August 2023. The CARE Network, is an 8th grade on-track initiative aimed at increasing the number of Black, Latinx, Indigenous or from low-income backgrounds who have a strong academic identity and are on-track in 8th grade to graduate from high school and successfully enter college and career.
